
FEED THE HUNGRY

We are forwarding this letter early to give your auxiliary enough time and an opportunity to search for a deserving person, and to forward your nomination to me in a timely fashion.

If you know of any person who is most worthy of this recognition, please forward the name, address, description of his or her services and performance to me. When considering your nominee for your recommendation, please follow the guidelines and criteria listed below.

- 1. Every Columbiette has the opportunity to submit recommendations to her Auxiliary.
- 2. Once the Auxiliary has chosen its nominee, the President of the Auxiliary must submit the nominee on Auxiliary letterhead and mail it to the Humanitarian Award Chairlady. Please do not mail your entry to the State President or any other State Officers or Past State President.
- 3. PLEASE NOTE: Only one nominee per Auxiliary. If your Auxiliary submits more than one entry, all entries will be disqualified.
- 4. Past State Presidents, State Officers, District Deputies and State Chairperson may submit recommendations through their auxiliaries.
- 5. Nominee cannot be a person who is serving in a religious order, such as a Priest, Nun, Brother, Deacon, Minister or Rabbi.
- 6. Nominee maybe of any race, creed or religion.
- 7. Nominee cannot be a Brother Knight or Sister Columbiette.
- 8. Nominee cannot be receiving Federal or State Funding or regular stipends.
- 9. Nominee name, address, biography and facts must be submitted to the Chairperson by the **deadline date of May 15**th
- 10. While participation in church ministries is admirable this award is for community service performed

The Ronald McDonald House

How It All Began

The first Ronald McDonald House was established in 1974, inspired by Kim Hill the 3-year-old daughter of Philadelphia Eagles tight end Fred Hill. When Kim was diagnosed with leukemia, Fred and his wife camped out on hospital chairs and ate food from vending machines during her treatment. Exhausted and frustrated, they wanted to create a place of refuge ad support for tother parents facing a similar situation.

Hill rallied the support of his teammates to raise funds for the cause. Through the Philadelphia Eagles General Manage, Jim Murray, the team offered its support to Dr. Audrey Evans, head of the pediatric oncology unit at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. Their partnership led to the first Ronald McDonald House, based in Philadelphia.

Stemming from this vision, Ronald McDonald Houses are now available throughout the world. In fact, ore than 10,000 families are guests each night at nearly 300 houses in 30 countries. Two of these houses are in New Jersey. One in Long Branch and one in New Brunswick. The New Brunswick house opened in 2005. Between the two more than 4,000 families have been helped.

The New Brunswick house includes:

- *** Six themed bedrooms with private baths and phones with voicemail, the smallest bedroom can accommodate up to three people and the largest up to six.
- *** A full kitchen with two of each appliance, a well-stocked pantry and a food storage area for each family.
- *** Laundry facilities with supplies
- *** Hygiene items, linens, and towels
- *** A comfortable living room with new computers
- *** A bright, fun playroom with an area for teens.
- *** An enclosed yard with a playground area and a covered porch for relaxing.
